

BLANKET DRIVE IMPACT

s part of Legacy's Leadership Academy, Miranda Demars '22 brought the idea of a blanket drive for the homeless to Student Life Director, Tom Keefe. With his help and the help of her fellow Leadership Academy classmates, they partnered with Legacy's Buddy Program to engage students across all age groups.

DISCIPLESHIP GROUP

nder the leadership of Mr. Dwight Velson, eight sophomore boys embraced a unique opportunity to pilot a discipleship training model at Legacy that was originally forged by Athletes in Action. This same model was employed by the University of Minnesota Gopher athletes who have seen explosive growth in discipleship groups from 34 seven years ago to over 400 Gopher athletes who meet every Sunday night.

The model involves not only devotional Bible studies, but also presentation of the Gospel, active listening, leading questions, and exploration of the twelve and prayer.



Big Buddies joined up with their Little Buddy classrooms to see which group could collect the most blankets for the drive. Chick-fil-A, the Leadership Academy

sponsor, jumped in and held their own blanket collection for two weeks at the Coon Rapids location! egacy's 4th grade students went to work running six businesses at Junior Achievement BizTown. From 9:00 am-2:00 pm students conducted business as usual at Delta, HB Fuller, Cargill, Pentair, the Tech Center and a cafe. They held roles such as CEO, manager, mechanic, scientist and sales representative, just to name a few. Several weeks of classroom learning led to this work day at the 12,000 square foot simulated city in St. Paul.

SCIENCE SOARS AT SECONDARY

n Middle School Science, Miss Carissa Nelson sponsored students Charlie Block, Haylee Montenegro, and Brady Murdoff in Legacy's first entry to the Toshiba/NSTA ExploraVision National Competition. The ExploraVision competition is a teachersponsored small group science competition that follows ideas from conception to reality. Over 400,000 students and a minimum of 100,000 teams (groups of 2-4) entered a project. Our students' Magnetic Flexible Building project, received Honorable Mention! This award placed our students' project among the top 10% of all projects submitted. Legacy students



were one of roughly 500 teams to earn an Honorable Mention and the ONLY Minnesota Middle School team to earn an award!

On the High School side, Legacy science teacher, Mr. Josh Coleman, instructed students on the use of TinkerCad and our new 3D printer. Students' created bridges and tested their effectiveness by adding weight to the breaking point. Students were scored based on the load to bridge weight ratio. Justin Demars '19 took home top honors! Students' were also able to participate in a drone building unit where racing drones were built from kits. Students' then programmed their flight controllers and tuned their drones for consistent flight. Each member of the class also learned the physics principles involved in flying them.





THE LEGACY CAMPAIGN ADVANCING THE MISSION



Completion is set for late spring of 2020.
